Altarnative Thoughts

Over and over I hear people say, "Somebody needs to..." Fill in the blank-the options are endless. Nobody can argue with the statement. There is a problem that needs to be dealt with so somebody needs to do something about it. Obviously.

Lately, any time I hear someone say, "Somebody needs to...," it has really been bugging me. At first, I wasn't sure why. Then it dawned on me: the words are empty because somebody is nobody. At least,

somebody is nobody unless somebody is me. When you say, "somebody," you are addressing nobody. The only way situations change and challenges get addressed is when I take the problem personally. What if that sense of annoyance is the prompting of the Holy Spirit calling you to act?

Think about Israel under the domination of Midian (Judges 6). The Israelites went into hiding because the Midianites and Amalekites and the people of the east were destroying their crops and livestock. Somebody needed to do something-somebody besides Gideon. He was a timid, inept man, threshing wheat down in a winepress so he wouldn't be spotted. He was the most insignificant member of his family, which was the weakest clan in the tribe. Gideon was nobody and he liked it that way because nobody gets to do nothing. Then the angel of Lord showed up, tapped him on the shoulder, and announced, "The Lord is with you, you mighty warrior." Suddenly, this nobody was somebody: the leader of a small army that would bring a great victory.

Next time you start the sentence, "Somebody needs to...," stop. Ask, "How can I be somebody?" With the Holy Spirit working through you, nobody is a nobody; you are somebody that can make a difference.

Learning About Conferences

JURISDICTIONAL CONFERENCE

You will remember that in May our pastor, Jonathan, participated in the General Conference, the global body of the United Methodist Church that meets to determine church law and doctrine. The



General Conference is then broken down into regional Jurisdictions (in the U.S.) and Central Conferences (throughout the world). This past week, July 13-26, Jonathan, was a delegate to the South Central Jurisdictional Conference held in Wichita, Kansas. The South Central Jurisdiction includes the UMCs in Texas, New Mexico, Louisiana, Arkansas, Oklahoma, Missouri, Kansas, and Nebraska. The most noteworthy work of this gathering is to elect and assign new bishops for the jurisdiction. Three were elected over the course of 35 ballots-a record number of ballots for this jurisdiction. The news that impacts our congregation is the naming of our new bishop. Bishop Scott Jones has served the past 8 years as the bishop of the Great Plains Conference (Kansas and Nebraska). Prior to being elected bishop, he served several churches and then became the professor of evangelism at Perkins School of Theology at SMU.

One other piece of news that you may have seen in the media is that the Western Jurisdiction elected an openly gay bishop. Because this action is in defiance of The Book of Discipline and antagonistic toward decisions made at General Conference, you can imagine the level of distress this is causing in our denomination. However, because the South Central Jurisdiction was still in session very late Friday night when this election occurred, a motion was passed to request that the Judicial Council (our version of the Supreme Court) issue a declaratory statement of church law regarding the election. The ruling will be made at their October session. Until then, please pray for wisdom, compassion toward one another, obedience to the Spirit's leading, and submission to the covenant we have made together as United Methodists.




